The police, local authorities and vets were informed and a camera has now been installed.

Thank you to everyone for donating towards the flower beds this year and maintaining them. They have been a great success.


Any help people can give me in helping keep the village tidy is very welcome. If you want to take on an area to look after, let me know.


Clyst Clatter

The Leaning Tree of Clyst Honiton




It is now even further from vertical and must surely be relying on advanced alien technology to prevent it falling over.

They have a reputation for being attracted to



News South of the A30 - Cats Protection Centre


Clyst Honiton residents were invited to visit the Devon Cats Protection Centre and have a tour by Mark, the Centre manager.

The building is very impressive with a specialist architect being involved to ensure that spaces were designed for the highest levels of cat welfare. Each cat pen is designed so that air is circulated and that the cat has varying levels of privacy available. The cats can see the garden beyond their windows, but no one is able to look in from the outside due to a mural screening.

There were cats ready for adoption, some cats nursing kittens and a long stay cat (for medical reasons) who loves escaping (which was witnessed on the visit).

The Centre has a stunning central courtyard garden with a large water

feature which can be used by staff and for fundraising events.



The cats brought into the Centre are examined, monitored, and are released for adoption only when they are deemed ready by the vet. Mark informed us that the adoption process is designed to minimise a cat's stay in the Centre. Cats for adoption are matched to new owners and their home environment to avoid cats being returned. Gone are the days where you walk along the pens and select one.


The tour was very informative and was attended by a range of residents from a teenager to an octogenarian and wheelchair access was fully tested on the tour.

The Centre is closed to visitors unless you have booked in, but fundraising coffee mornings allow you access to this bespoke Centre which was fully funded through financial gifts.

Airport News

Exeter Airport has declared a profit after passenger numbers increased - the first surplus it has made since 2019. The number of flights has dropped slightly from last year to 28,000. The West Atlantic night-time mail flights



will end in 2025 when Royal Mail will move the tonnes of cargo, currently flown to the East Midlands, with vans and HGVs in order to achieve net zero carbon, a challenge for aviation.




